- 4. Interactive method technology. Rely on the originality of students, create anatmosphere of free discussion in the classroom. To do this, the class is separated intosmall groups and work with these groups throughout the lesson.
- 5. Technology of educational games. Use a changeability of didactic games in the classroomand use them to stimulate, activate and interest in the lesson.
- 6. Test lessons. By changing and diversifying the forms and methods of teachingon the basis of new pedagogical technologies, the teacher turns the

- 1. The stage of the call. At this stage, the goals are to activate students, to get into the essence of the topic, to feel it, to prepare it for the process of understanding. In this process, students exchange ideas while answering questions posed by the teacher.
- 2. Mental attack phase. This method can be used at the beginning of the lesson oranywhere, and it involves solving the problem by expressing your own ideas andopinions. For example, the teacher writes the word language on the board and asks thestudents, "What did you think of this word, or how else can you interpret that word?"

He asks. The teacher can write the attitudes expressed by the students on the board inthe following order: The opinions of the teachers should not be found to be wrong, butthe teacher should help the students as much as possible. encourage them not to beafraid of the heat, and at the end the teacher should analyze both of the ideas expressed.

In this process, students learn a lot about the word, that is, the problem is given tostudents through a mental attack, opened with their thoughts, and as a result, the topicis easier to understand.

3. The stage of understanding. At this stage, the conclusion of the discussion onhe topic of the stage of mental attack is heard, and the teacher fills it with new ideas. Questions and answers reinforce the topic.

4. The stage of intelligent. At this stage, students are asked to describe in writingthe knowledge and concepts they have acquired on the topic in short sentences. Tocomplete this task, the teacher divides the students into groups of 3-7 people and distributes a sheet of paper to them. For example, on the topic of "Word-sentences", the teacher assigns each group the task of identifying 3 specific features of wordssentences and allocates a certain amount of time for this task. Each student in the grouphas their own judgment. One student writes down the ideas. While the students are busywith the task in groups, the teacher walks around the classroom, observing everyoneand commenting on the task, helping those who need help.

At the end of the time, everyone's attention is drawn to the blackboard. Onerepresentative (presenter) from each group goes to the class board and presents the taskperformed by the group to the whole class. Each presentation will be evaluated. At theend of all group work, the teacher explains to them, corrects and summarizes themistakes, gives an overall assessment of the work of the group. Each teacher effectivelyuses the types of interactive lessons to improve the teaching and learning activities.

They should contribute to the development of students' ability to acquire knowledgeindependently, develop critical thinking skills and develop as a well-rounded person. The main purpose of the use of interactive methods in education is to help the teacherto reconsider his pedagogical treasure, to generate a desire for a higher qualitymethodological direction, to encourage further thinking, research, experimentation. - differentiated and separate methods, which makes it possible to create yourown learning trajectory;
- activity-based nature of training, its communicative and cognitive orientation;
- socio-cultural orientation, including students in the dialogue of cultures.

No less significant for the restructuring of the entire education system is the principle of activity-based learning. Functional to all academic disciplines, it meansstrengthening the external and internal activity of the student. It can be considered as anew interpretation of the principle of activity. In relation to a foreign language, this principle means an increase in the proportion of students ' speech activity, including the use of group and collective

forms of learning. Further, the exercises aimed atmastering receptive or productive language material should, if possible, be of a creativenature that simulates real communication. The development of internal activity shouldplay no less a role. This resources that work on a text, for example, should be associated with the solution of mental problems, exercises with language material should becombined with the solution of conditionally communicative tasks, etc. All this will contribute to the internal activity of students.

The first such principle is the principle of communication, or communicative orientation. We will immediately note that this principle is shared by the majority of Uzbek Methodists. This principle entire means that the orientation of the educational process is connected with the goal of forming communication skills in the languagebeing studied. From these positions, the final and intermediate goals are determined, the selection of language material necessary for communication is made, and the process of language acquisition and control of learning results is built. However, thisunderstanding, which is accepted in many manuals, is not enough. Languageacquisition is inextricably linked to the acquisition of the culture of the country of thelanguage being studied.

The fact that the sympathetic of the process of communication is not only withthe possession of language material, but also with shared knowledge of theinterlocutors the main part of the content of the substantive content.including speech. i.e. its knowledge of culture of countries that we represent interlocutors, the scaled background knowledge.
